Strolling Sutter Creek ~ Homes of the 45th Home Tour

Miners' Bend Historic Gold Mining Park

South End of Sutter Creek


Miners' Bend Historic Gold Mining Park, located at the south end of Sutter Creek, is Amador County's newest attraction. The park displays equipment that was used in county gold mines of the past and present. Actual artifacts used in the extraction of gold have been donated by local Amador County mines and other generous donors.

The organization responsible for the creation of Miners' Bend is the Sutter Creek Community Benefit Foundation, which was created in 2012. The project has been spearheaded by foundation chair Frank Cunha, along with assistance from Ed Arata, Robin Peters, and Louis Boitano, who have secured the historic mining equipment.

The SCCBF, in partnership with the City of Sutter Creek, transformed a weed-filled lot at the end of town into a beautiful and historic park that visitors and locals alike will enjoy for many generations to come. Two years ago, work began by clearing the ground. On June 1, 2015, at the ground-breaking ceremony, the community was asked to help pick a name. The winning name, "Miners' Bend," is most appropriate since this is the site of an original miners' encampment.

The park's centerpiece is a five-head stamp mill built in 1882 at Sutter Creek's Knight Foundry. A replica of a head frame with winch, motor, mine shaft, and ore cars sits next to the park entrance. The three bronze statues by artist Louis DeMartino were commissioned by PacBell in 1976. They were displayed at the San Francisco headquarters until 2010. Later, they were salvaged by local realtor Tom Blackman who stored them while searching for a suitable location. Upon seeing the work at Miners' Bend, he graciously donated them to the SCCBF.

The new park has informative plaques, picnic benches, trees, and hand-stacked rock walls lining the park. A Commemorative Walkway was constructed of bricks engraved with the names of families, pets, businesses, events, and more. Additional bricks



can still be purchased (contact sccbf.org) and added to the walkway. Funds raised will be used for future projects at the park and elsewhere in Sutter Creek.

Strolling Sutter Creek ~ Homes of the 45th Home Tour

45 Elm Street — Owners: John Walsh & Bonnie Spencer

Immediately you know this is the home of a loyal Boston Red Sox fan. You cannot tell by the home's traditional Victorian exterior, but you cannot miss the Red Sox baseball protruding from the home's front window. This combination of tradition and playfulness is the home's character.

Owners John Walsh and Bonnie Spencer spent years renovating this home from a modest 1100 square feet to its present 2,068 square feet. Built in 1871, the home still retains its historic origins. The front fence is Queen Ann picket, which John Walsh milled by hand. The living room preserves a Victorian style, with original knotty pine floors, crown molding, and antique fireplace mantle.

Family heirlooms and artwork complete the decor, including needlework stitched by Bonnie's grandmother while on the Oregon Trail.

The adjoining dining room has cranberry colored walls, showcasing the room's centerpiece, an antique chandelier, which Bonnie's grandmother ordered from Sears. A Tiffany style lamp was built by Bonnie, as was the grandfather clock. Photos and artwork show views of the original home and old Sutter Creek.

Upstairs is a cozy quilting room, that can easily transform to a small bedroom, a perfect setting for quilting or reading books under the eaves. On the first floor are a guest bedroom and bathroom. The guest bathroom was the first room to be remodeled, retaining a vintage feel with wallpaper, claw-foot tub, and hand painted tiles.



A large great room and kitchen are where the original home ended. The room is warm and inviting. The floor and ceiling beams are whitewashed and stenciled in a charming pattern created by Bonnie. Cabinets are whitewashed pine, built by local cabinet maker John LeSage. The owner's collection of vintage fire trucks, cars, and airplanes decorate the cabinet tops. Look around the room. Can you find Fenway Park?

A new addition has a picture gallery hallway leading to an office and master bedroom. The master bedroom features a beautiful antique bed with a quilted wall hanging of 45 Elm Street, created by Bonnie's mother. Outside is a picturesque backyard patio and hillside with shade trees and vegetable garden. Around the patio corner is a secluded hot tub, a fitting ending to your tour of this fun and vintage home.

Linda & Don Meadows Home — 146 Spanish Street

The home at 146 Spanish Street is owned by Linda and Don Meadows. They own the Creeky Cupboard gift shop in Sutter Creek, a great inspiration for their home's charm.

Don and Linda bought the home in 2005. Originally built in the 1800s, the home was almost completely rebuilt in 1997 by previous owner Sharon Lundgren, who also added a second story. The present home is a modified Victorian with three bedrooms, two baths, and approximately 1,650 square feet. For the couple, who moved from a 2,700 square foot home on seven-acres, this was practically "tiny house" living.

The main living area is an open design of parlor, living room, and dining room, each space flowing into the next. The flooring is oak throughout, recycled from an old dance studio in Ione. The decor is vintage with touches of whimsy. Pictures on the walls are by artist Scott Gustafson and depict nursery rhymes.

Upstairs, a loft area provides an intimate sitting room, and a spot to display antique quilts and conversation pieces, such as an antique wall telephone. The master bedroom has a high-beamed cathedral ceiling, making the room light-filled and airy. The master bath has a claw-foot tub, an old-fashioned commode with overhead chain-pull tank, and a lovely hand-painted sink.

A third bedroom is where Linda stores the many handmade baby afghans for her project "Afghans for Angels." Visit her



website afghansforangelscalifornia.com to see the wonderful service this project provides. Linda said she always welcomes helping volunteers.

Downstairs is the recently remodeled kitchen. Phil Longacre did the design and cabinetry. Dan Schoen did the construction. The kitchen floor is maple and the white cabinets are bead board, with black granite countertops. Accessories, such as the Tiffany-style pendant lights, give the modern kitchen a vintage feel.

The kitchen opens to the outdoor patio area, with three levels surrounded by impressive stacked-rock walls. A covered patio is at the top tier. This is the perfect party venue, or perhaps a relaxing spot to unwind from a long day.

Home Tour Update

Strolling Sutter Creek:

Our 45th Annual AAUW Home Tour on April 22nd promises to be an awesome adventure into the history of Sutter Creek. The five homes that we are showcasing are unique to our tour, with years of special thought and care to make each one a tribute to the original style of the home, the personality of the owner, and their family history.



We will continue, as we did last year, to distribute tear sheets with the posters both having the same general information. Postcards to past tour participants will go out by March 1 to encourage advance ticket sales. Starting March 14th, people will be able to buy tickets on our website using credit cards or Pay Pal, as well as several local locations. People have asked for years to use credit cards and starting last year they can — on the website only.

Amador Transit last year approved a shuttle to take visitors and hostesses who park at Amador High School to the homes and historic sites. Home Tour has now been added to the Transit calendar which provides us with access to shuttles again this year and in the future. Parking is often difficult during our tours so this will be a huge help. It also helps to just hop on late in the afternoon for those uphill runs.

Detailed information on the tour sites — five homes and five historic sites — start in this issue of *Gold Filings*. The rest will follow in March and April. There is also an additional site for the Tea, Cookies and Music where the Quilt will be displayed. All of these sites are a short walk from one another.




A number of members participated in the Women's March in Sacramento on January 21st in support of AAUW's mission to empower women as individuals and as a community. (See photos on page 1)

Dear Amador American Association of University Women,

On behalf of the Plymouth Elementary fifth grade class, I'm writing to let you know about an opportunity to support students in their fundraising efforts for sixth grade science camp, taking place in fall 2017. The mission of the AAUW to promoting equity for women and girls through education, more specifically your 2016/17 goal of "Tech-Connect-Care!" and hosting a Tech Trek day for local sixth grade students with a focus on S.T.E.M., fits perfectly with this opportunity.

Of our class of twenty-six students, sixteen are girls, and all are working hard to raise the \$375/student required to attend camp. An opportunity to attend science camp can be the first time a deeper interest in science is experienced for this future generation of women. Attending camp provides them the chance to see science, environment, ecology, and more in a new and exciting way, off the text book pages, and in real life. It's a chance to show them how they may be able to put a degree in science to use, and to learn about opportunities available to them in "non-traditional," in demand, high paying careers. This opportunity can be the spark that ignites a desire to reach beyond a high school education. We hope that the Amador branch of the American Association of University Women is able to support these students in their fundraising efforts.

Project Description:

The 6th grade students at Plymouth Elementary have the opportunity to head to the coastal mountains for the biggest adventure of their elementary school careers. This is a fabulous experience for children, both academically and socially, as they live, work, and learn together for five days in a coastal mountain setting, with trips to the redwoods, and the beach; an experience they will remember for a lifetime, and an opportunity many may not get outside of this trip. The Cost for this 5 day, 4 night trip is \$375/student and includes all meals, lodging, transportation, and excursions for science based learning in the redwoods and at the beach.

The school budget does not pay for this trip; a total cost of \$9,750 for all 26 students to attend. We need your help to make it happen! Sponsorship from the Amador American Association of University Women will help make this wonderful experience possible. Your donation will have a direct positive impact on the educational lives of students in your community, many who would not get an opportunity for this type of learning experience without your support.


Other Sources of Funding:

Students begin fundraising for sixth grade science camp at the beginning of fifth grade. We just hosted our annual Walk-A-Thon where the 5th grade class raised \$1,026 to go towards camp. Other fundraisers that are planned include hosting a cake walk at the school fall carnival (projected earnings of \$500) and serving guests/hosting a dessert auction at the school's annual crab feed (projected earnings of \$1,500). There are also plans to hold a spring catalog type sale (projected earnings \$2,500). With our current planned fundraisers, the total projected earned funds for science camp are \$5,526. In addition to fundraising efforts, we ask student families to contribute \$100 each towards the cost of camp, approximately ten students in our class have requested scholarships for this amount due to financial hardship (projected contributions from families \$1,600). The total amounts of funds we anticipate raising towards the cost of camp are \$7,126. This leaves us \$2,624 short of our total cost to attend camp. With the American Association of University Women, and additional community/business support, we hope to be able to raise the additional \$2,624 needed for the sixth grade class to attend camp in September 2017.
