

Act Now to Support Important State and National Legislation

On April 2 several Amador Branch members lobbied representatives of the California Assembly and Senate. The lobbyists presented arguments in favor of passing three bills supported by AAUW California. April is Sexual Awareness Month, and the three bills are focused on policies that combat the pervasive conditions allowing assault and harassment to continue.

The three bills are:

AB 2843, Health Coverage for Rape and Sexual Assault Survivors AB 2326, Public Postsecondary Education: Sex Discrimination Policies AB 2099, Protecting Reproductive Health Clinics

Contact your Senator and Assembly member(this can vary depending on where you live in the county) and urge them to pass these important bills.

AAUW Washington Update:

Combatting Gender-Based Harassment in Schools and Work

AAUW National is also supporting bills that protect the survivors of sexual discrimination. This month, Congress is expected to reintroduce a key piece of legislation addressing many facets of harassment in the workplace. The Department of Education is also expected to announce updated Title IX rules that would strengthen protections in educational institutions.

The Bringing an End to Harassment by Enhancing Accountability and Rejecting Discrimination (BE HEARD) in the Workplace Act would build on existing civil rights laws to provide new protections against harassment for workers and safeguard existing discrimination laws.

What you can do today: Reach out to your members of Congress today — it is critical for Congress to hear from you now to build support for the BE HEARD Act when it is introduced. When workers face harassment, it impacts their success in the workplace, and ultimately, their economic security. This is particularly true for women and people

of color, who are disproportionately impacted by harassment. By passing the BE HEARD Act, Congress can let survivors know "we hear you, we support you, and we will stand by you."

Take action for all working people and urge your members of Congress to cosponsor the BE HEARD Act now!

More Women's History

How Did Mother's Day Begin?

A. In 1858, when Ann Jarvis, a young Appalachian homemaker, organized "Mother's Work Days" to improve the sanitation and avert deaths from disease-bearing insects and seepage of polluted water.

B. In 1872, when Boston poet, pacifist and women's suffragest Julia Ward Howe established a special day for mothers –and for peace– not long after the bloody Franco-Prussian War.

C. In 1905, when Ann Jarvis died. Her daughter, Anna, decided to memorialize her mother's lifelong activism, and began a campaign that culminated in 1914 when Congress passed a Mother's Day resolution.

The correct answer: All of the above.

Each woman and all of these events have contributed to the present occasion now celebrated on the second Sunday in May.

Aging But DANGEROUS

Until 1974 in the USA women were unable to open a bank account or acquire a line of credit without a man co-signing. The financial services industry was led by (usually white) men. So eight women came together to turn everything around by opening their own Women's Bank by each pitching in \$1,000.

On 14 July 1978 The Women's Bank opened for business. People stood in line down the street in downtown Denver to deposit their money. The first day's deposits exceeded \$1 million.

Membership Renewal Period Now Open

If your membership renewal date is June 30, you should have received an email from the National Office already. For those who joined recently, your renewal date is one year from the date you joined.

Members who are comfortable with renewing online AND whose renewal fees are due July 1 will have an accurate fee charged and it takes about 5 minutes to complete the process. If you are not comfortable renewing online, you may send a check made out to AAUW Amador for \$115 and send it via mail: PO Box 611, Sutter Creek, CA 95685

IMPORTANT NOTE: The increase becomes effective for new members or renewals beginning FY 07/01/24 and does not apply to either renewal or new member fees that are due or that occur prior to 07/01/24. If you happen to be speaking with a prospective member, please note that it will cost \$112 to join before 7/1 and \$115 to join on or after July 1.

If you are renewing online, ignore the Personal Snapshot button and just renew. States are listed alphabetically, but branches are listed numerically. We are Branch # 0150 so are near the bottom of the list.

Solar Eclipse on April 8

My husband, Bob, is an avid photographer, so it made sense to schedule a trip to the total solar eclipse. My brother lives in Carmel, Indiana (a suburb of Indianapolis) and he invited us to join him for the eclipse. It turned out that we couldn't fly because of all the camera gear, so we did a road trip.

Along with 50,000 other people, we attended the event sponsored by the Indianapolis Speedway. They partnered with NASA and Purdue University to present a wonderful STEM program featuring several former astronauts, including several women. They shared their reasons for choosing to be an astronaut and all their answers were very inspiring. It was a presentation that would make AAUW members proud. I certainly was.

Did you know that Neil Armstrong wasn't a recluse as he is so often portrayed in the media? His two sons were part of the NASA/Purdue presentation and wanted to put that rumor to rest. Neil and his wife spent Friday nights with at least 20 friends for several years. As it happened, Neil selected to attend events that the media was not invited to, so the media made up this rumor.

Did you know that Purdue University is the cradle of the astronaut program? My niece is attending Purdue for electrical engineering, so she gave us a tour of the campus. Portraits of many astronauts line the sidewalks of the campus. There is also a sculpture of Neil Armstrong in front of the building housing the astronaut program.

Now for the eclipse itself. It's humbling when it's 3pm in the afternoon and the earth suddenly goes dark. Frogs started croaking as if it were evening. The crowd was very friendly and we all applauded totality. If you ever get a chance to experience a total eclipse, it's like nothing you've ever experienced before. Totally amazing!

*Feeling frustrated with yourself, guilt, shame even, for protecting the peace and comfort

of others because you're worried about the ramifications.

*Fear-based decision-making rarely leads to outcomes that are aligned for our highest good and I continue to learn that every day.

Therefore these two questions I continue to ask myself when I hesitate or feel like retreating:

Who is my silence protecting and at what cost to me?

Therefore, whose peace am I actually keeping?

Because I know it's not mine.
