An Asian-American story:

Mary Tape immigrated to the United States at age 11 and ended up as a servant in a brothel in San Francisco. She was raised at the Ladies' Protection and Relief Society, where she took the name of Mary McGladery. Mary met and married a young Chinese immigrant, Joseph Tape. He established his own prosperous transportation and immigration brokering business.

Their wealth could not inoculate them from racial discrimination during this time of anti-Chinese exclusion and racial hostility. In 1884, their daughter was denied admission to a local school because she is Chinese. Incensed, Mary wrote an impassioned letter, and the

Tapes sued the San Francisco Board of Education. They won the landmark case Tape v. Hurley, which guaranteed Chinese children the right to a public-school education.

After the court decision, the school district built a Chinese Primary School, "suitable for Mongolian children". The Tape case and the state's reaction **foreshadowed the "separate but equal" doctrine soon to become law in the 1896 decision Plessy v. Ferguson.**



IF YOU HAVE 15 MINUTES...

CHECK OUT A BANNED BOOK

Circulation matters! Circulation data can be used to support keeping challenged books on shelves and to justify ordering more books by the same authors or on the same topic.

BUY A BANNED BOOK

Censorship doesn't just harm libraries and schools; it also impacts writers, publishers, and booksellers. Support the people who make and sell books by buying them!

You can also donate the books you purchase to:

- Public and school libraries: Contact your local library or school to find out what they need and how to donate.
- Little Free Library: Use their free app (LittleFreeLibrary.org/app/) to find a book-sharing box near you!
- Fundraisers: Many public libraries are supported by groups that use donated books to raise money.
- A banned book giveaway or bookmobile:
 Call your local bookstore to see if they're hosting a giveaway or supporting a bookmobile.

IF YOU HAVE 30 MINUTES ...

WRITE A LETTER OR E-MAIL

Write to local school and library boards and elected officials to ask them to defend the right to read for the entire community. Make a public statement for the right to read by writing a letter to the editor in your local paper. Finally, a letter can show library staff, educators, authors, and vulnerable readers that you support them!

PLAN TO ATTEND A MEETING

While decisions about book bans and library policies are being made at all levels of government, some of the biggest battles are being fought locally. Plan to attend local board and city council meetings to let officials know that many people (including you!) support access to information and oppose censorship.

Women Lead the Way On Booker Prize Nominations

For the first time in the literary awards' history, 5 of the 6 nominated novels are by female writers. First awarded in 1969, the Booker Prize is awarded each year to a novel written in English and published in England or Ireland.

Over the years the prize had created literary sensations and capped lifetime careers. Sara Collins, a novelist and a judge, described this as "a gratifying and thrilling moment." The judges will now reread the books on the short list and will announce the winner at a ceremony in London on November 12.

Don't you hate it when someone takes credit for another person's idea? It happens a lot, and the people who lose out are often women. This book tells the stories of women whose inventions, discoveries, and creations were credited to men—women like Zelda Fitzgerald, the novelist, painter, and playwright who was more than F. Scott's wife, and Margaret Knight, who invented the flat-bottomed paper bag but saw the patent go to a man who stole off to the Patent Office with her idea. By telling the stories of the brilliant women artists, inventors, scientists, architects, and mathematicians who were denied their due,

Oh No He Didn't! will help all women tackle obstacles and create a kinship of understanding that will inspire and transcend generations.
