
Message from the Leadership Committee

Project 2025

What is Project 2025?

Project 2025 is a 900-page policy "wish list" for the next Republican president, a proposal that would expand presidential power and impose an ultra-conservative social vision. It proposes that the entire federal bureaucracy, including independent agencies such as the Department of Justice, be placed under direct presidential control - a controversial idea known as "unitary executive theory".

In practice, that would streamline decision-making, allowing the president to directly implement policies in a number of areas. The proposals also call for eliminating job protections for thousands of government employees, who could then be replaced by political appointees.

Who wrote Project 2025? The Heritage Foundation, which is one of Washington's most prominent rightwing think tanks. It first produced policy plans for future Republican administrations in 1981, when Ronald Reagan was about to take office. It has produced similar documents in connection with subsequent presidential elections, including in 2016, when Trump won the presidency.

Dozens of former Trump administration officials have contributed to the think tank's proposals, providing Democrats with an attack line against the former president. Trump began pushing away from

the document in early July. "I know nothing about Project 2025," he posted on his social media platform, Truth Social. "I have no idea who is behind it."

It's been 40 years since the release of <u>ONE FINE DAY</u>. And American women have made progress. There are far fewer barriers blocking our path than there were in 1984. But one door remains locked and bolted. The door to the Oval Office. There is yet to be a woman elected President of the United States.

In honor of candidate Kamala Harris, <u>One Fine Day</u> has been updated to include a few of the many gains we have made over the past 40 years – to celebrate a few of the many women who have broken through barriers.

Kay Weaver and Martha Wheelock began work on their Music Film, <u>One Fine Day</u> in 1983. When Geraldine Ferraro was nominated for Vice President in 1984, Kay and Martha added images of the nominee to their production in progress and used the film, in part, to promote Ferraro's campaign. <u>One Fine Day</u> was made to bring Women's History into schools and public spaces. *To Make Women and their accomplishments More Visible*!

In our screenings, women wept and cheered. It became more than just a film—it was a personal mantra, an ode to encouragement. Women love to celebrate their foremothers and to acknowledge their impact on our lives. As Kamala Harris said when she became our Vice President in 2020, "All the heroic and ambitious women before me, whose sacrifice, determination, and resilience make my presence here today even possible."
