Cathy Patrenos has a background as a nurse, a medical malpractice defense attorney and a captain in the Air Force Reserves Nurse Corps. In the 70's, she journeyed through Europe to Istanbul and across the Middle East to India, what was then known as the "hippie trail," a route that soon thereafter closed to travelers at the start of the Iranian revolution and the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. Cathy will discuss her second novel, *The Silk Road Score*, a fictional adventure/crime story based on her actual journey on the hippie trail, except for the crime, of course. Cathy and her husband live in Sutter Creek.

Melene and Geoff Smith will discuss the book they co-authored with others, *Kirkwood: Stories from the First Fifty Years*. The publication includes first-hand accounts of Kirkwood founders and icons, the early days of Kirkwood, crazy times at the Kirkwood Inn, ski adventures, rescue dogs, and sleigh rides. Also included are behind the scenes information about wastewater, Kirkwood Meadows Public Utility District, the volunteer fire department and medical clinic. AAUW Amador raised \$4,796 on Giving Tuesday 2024 for Tech Trek and Upper Division college level student scholarship funds! With gratitude to every donor for helping to make a difference for local students.





Giving Tuesday, on December 3, was an opportunity to raise funds to send local junior high students to Tech Trek summer camp and provide financial support to local students pursuing upper-level college courses. While the ambitious \$6,000 goal wasn't quite reached, the branch raised an impressive \$4,340 in one day from members and other generous supporters! The partial matching amount by the Amador Community Foundation (ACF) of \$456.37 brought the grand total to \$4,796.37. These funds are added to the branch fund held by ACF and are only awarded for student scholarships. The great news is that the branch plans to award an additional Tech Trek scholarship in 2025!

The branch Leadership Committee wishes to acknowledge everyone who donated and/or attended the event with its sincere appreciation for helping to make this a positive and successful day of giving. I was born and raised in the San Fernando Valley. I received my AA in Biology from Santa Monica College and in 1987 graduated from UC Davis with a degree in Nutrition Science. I attended the University of Cincinnati, College of Medicine The year I received my MD degree I gave birth to my daughter, Sarah. I took the year off between medical school and starting my internship in Psychiatry to spend time with my infant daughter. It was very difficult going from spending all my time with Sarah to entering an internship working 80-100 hours a week! I did a 3-year residency in Psychiatry and an additional 2-year fellowship in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at UC Davis, Dept. of Psychiatry, completing my training in 1998.

Professionally, I have worn many hats: I was Medical Director at Heritage Oaks Hospital, Adolescent Unit 1998-1999. I started a solo private practice in 1998, which has continued to the present. From 1998-2008, I worked as an outpatient Psychiatrist treating and caring for foster children and children on MediCal. In 2000, I concurrently became the Medical Director of Outpatient

Services at Sutter Center for Psychiatry and worked primarily on the Child and Adolescent Unit. Also in 2000, I began working as a medical expert in psychiatry and for 17 years worked with many attorneys on approximately 250 cases.

In 2014, I left Sutter Center for Psychiatry to focus full time on my private practice. As a double board-certified psychiatrist, I treat patients ranging in age from 5-85. My passion is to help people improve their mental health, to help them find greater peace in their lives and within themselves and relieve their suffering. I integrate a holistic approach of nutrition, lifestyle, mindfulness practice, and research based alternative therapies.

This past May, I moved my office from Sacramento to Jackson and my husband and I completed the build of our custom, 100% off-grid, high efficiency home on beautiful acreage outside of lone. Starting in January, I will be cutting back to working 2-3 days/week so I can enjoy more time with family, developing our property and traveling. In 2025, my husband and I may offer meditation and mindfulness practice instruction at my office for anyone interested.

CEO Blackwell Interview: What Happens if the Education Department Is Dissolved?

The problem: <u>Bill S.5384</u> was introduced last month to the 118th Congress calling for the Department of Education's abolishment.

Why it matters: The department plays a critical role in protecting civil rights, providing financial aid, and supporting students with the greatest needs. Its elimination would jeopardize funding for low-income schools, special education programs, and make higher education a riskier bet for students.

Mosaics

From NY Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio

Sometimes people will ask me, "There is so much happening in the world and in the country, and it all feels so big and overwhelming - what can I even do as one person?" What I try to convey every time is that no action is too small, and if you feel so moved, you can and should start with whatever is within arm's reach or in your backyard. You can even start with yourself.

We live in a culture of grand gestures and big ambitions, but that also means we should be wary of how much "get-rich-quick" thinking can perpetuate beyond money schemes and into the idea that any/all major, impactful shifts happen suddenly and in dramatic fashion with a handful of major figures. The fact is that couldn't be further from the truth. Revolutionary and transformative changes, from the inside out, happen more like mosaics.

Think of it like this: no matter who we are, how visible or invisible or big or small, each one of us is just one tile. Whether you see that as liberating or disempowering is a matter of perspective. When you have your eye pressed all the way up to the single tile of a mosaic, it can look quite meaningless. A single piece of shattered glass could look worthless. Or perhaps a piece of small painted porcelain could seem beautiful, but too small to "be" anything. Or maybe a stunning rare slab of stone may think itself as the biggest piece when it is.

The two secrets of mosaics are:

- 1. Each piece (us + our small actions) is far more powerful and meaningful than we know,
- 2. Each piece (we) need each other far more than we realize.

When we are able to step back from thinking our own broken, unfinished pieces are not enough and start to see how all the other little pieces glistening alongside us start to form eyes and ears and abstract beauty and landscapes and symbols and more, we realize that just because we didn't see the big picture at first doesn't mean we weren't part of one.

So just do the small thing - for yourself and others. Choose your actions with humility, love, and enthusiasm. It means more than you know, and the world thanks you for it.
