Tech Trek

Tech Trek Visitor Day Branch Representatives: Julie Taylor, Greta McElroy-White

This year's Amador Tech Trek campers, Avery Metz, Meadow Fisk and Meris Schauer, reported they were having a great time on Tech Trek Camp Visitor Day (Thursday, July 17).

Approximately 35 Northern CA
AAUW members spent the morning
on the UC Davis campus observing
92 campers participate in core
classes of Anatomy, Plant Biology,
Coding, Engineering, and Genetics at
UC Davis/Camp Jemison.




Members sat with their branch campers during lunch to hear about their experiences with classes, dorm life, and friendly competitions. When asked if they would keep in touch with the program, the Amador campers were unanimous in expressing their intent to return in a few years as counselors (the minimum age to be a counselor is 16). Clearly the camp had a significant impact on them and there was still the excitement of that evening's cardboard and duct tape boat races and team-built robot races the following day. No one was anxious to go home!

During lunch, it was announced that a camp name had been selected after voting by campers earlier in the week. While all the women in STEM careers were strong contenders, Mae Jemison, the first African-American female to travel into space onboard the Space Shuttle Endeavor in 1992, rose above the others. Dr. Jemison is also an engineer, a physician and a scientist. UC Davis Tech Trek was re-named Camp Jemison.

Branch members are encouraged to attend a future Visitor Day to show support for the students. During a Q&A session with the Camp Director, she explained that it is discouraging for students who do not have a branch representative attend the event. To alleviate disappointment, lunch tables were pre-arranged to put such campers together; the Amador table welcomed three Siskiyou County campers.

One last note; Amador's students were very appreciative of the opportunity to attend Tech Trek and expressed their gratitude in being selected. We will hear about their camp experience first-hand at the September meeting including how the cardboard boats fared and which team's robot made it over the finish line.

Finding Your Voice

The Two-Minute Activist

Let's begin with the question, "What is an advocate"? Merriam-Webster defines an advocate as (1) one who defends or maintains a cause or proposal [e.g. an education for women advocate], (2) one who supports or promotes the interests of a cause or group [e.g. a women's health advocate], or (3) one who pleads the cause of another [e.g. a social justice advocate].

You joined AAUW because you believe it is important to help advance gender equity and create a more economically secure world for women and girls. Advocating for these beliefs can be performed in many ways; you don't have to march or protest, but that is your right. Alternatively, you can be a *Two-Minute Activist* by joining AAUW members in the fight for equal pay, equity in education, paid leave, protections against sexual harassment and more. Sign up to get alerts on when and how to engage, including sending letters to legislators, writing letters to the editor of a newspaper, and other timely calls to action.

We need this now more than ever.

AAUW's Public Policy issues are at Two-Minute-Activist. Current priorities include:

- Ø Prioritize Paid Leave & Child Care
- Ø Raise the Federal Minimum Wage
- Ø BE HEARD in the Workplace Act
- Ø Support the Healthy Families Act
- Ø Support the Gender Equity in Education Act

With your help, AAUW can let Congress know that members want to see improved and expanded legislation that protects access to education, economic security and civil rights.

State Bills Would Require Passport or Birth Certificate to Register to Vote

State legislatures around the country are considering bills that would require Americans to present a passport or birth certificate to register to vote. Much of this legislation echoes the SAVE Act, a federal bill passed by the House in April that has now been pending in the Senate amidst significant opposition from legislators and constituents alike. It also mirrors a similar executive order signed by President Trump in March that two federal judges have partially blocked, including one in a Brennan Center lawsuit.

These policies purport to prevent widespread voting by noncitizens, which in reality is not a problem. Instead, the SAVE Act would block tens of millions of American citizens from voting because they don't have ready access to the documents required. It would also upend voter registration systems nationwide. The state versions of the bill would cause similar damage to the freedom to vote.

Despite certain lawmakers prioritizing these suppressive policies, voters and advocates have been successful in slowing their progress in some states.

In total, lawmakers in at least 27 states have introduced one or more bills in 2025 that would require some or all voters to show citizenship documents to vote. So far, only Indiana and Wyoming enacted such laws.

Holidays and Significant Dates in August

- National Black Business Month: Celebrated throughout the month of August.

Answer #1 2025 is a special year—not just because of world events or personal milestones, but mathematically! It's a perfect square: $45 \times 45 = 2025$. Perfect square years are rare, and given typical human lifespans, 2025 is likely the only one most people alive today will experience to prove they themselves are not square!

Answer #2 April 10 is the 100th day of the year (101st in leap years) in the Gregorian calendar; 265 days remain until the end of the year.

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
